## Ukrainian students at Polish universities: case study of the Maria Curie-Skłodowska University in Lublin


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## Ukrainian students in Poland

- In the 2016/17 academic year, 65.793 foreign students from 166 countries studied in Poland (over 8.500 more than a year earlier).
- Since 2005, Polish universities have consistently increased the number of foreign students who currently constitute 4.88% of all students in our country (eight years ago they were only 0.61%).
- The students from Ukraine have been the dominant group of foreigners at Polish universities for several years. In the academic year 2016/17, 35 584 Ukrainians were studying in Poland.

- A large influence on the growing number of Ukrainians at Polish universities has, among others:
- activities of the "Study in Poland" program
- other activities at the regional and central level
- marketing activities of the university
- similar culture and language
- close neighborhood
- Poland's membership in the EU
- wide range of fields of study, high level of lecturers
- Polish Card
- conflict in East Ukraine



## Ukrainian students at MCSU

- The Maria Curie-Skłodowska University in Lublin (MCSU) is a leader in Poland in terms of the number of foreign students.
- Currently, 1,600 students from abroad study at the university, which is 6.75% of all students (data from 2016).
- Among the foreigners, students from Ukraine dominate (in 2016 - 1397 students).

- Ukrainian students choose Lublin because:
- convenient geographical location
- proximity to the border
- good communication connections
- promotion activity
- Most of them come from the western regions of Ukraine (including the following districts: Chmielnicki, Lviv, and Volyn).

- The largest number of foreign students study at the Faculty of Political Science.
- In 2014, over 180 people studied there from Eastern European countries, the vast majority of Ukrainians.
- They study mainly in the field of International Relations.
  Journalism and Social Communication are also popular among them.
- The Faculty appointed in 2014 the Plenipotentiary for Students from Eastern Europe.

## The main problems faced by Ukrainian students at MCSU are:

- problems with the Polish language at the beginning of studies
- conflicts with Polish students (accusations from Polish students about taking places in dormitories and taking internships)
- negative stereotypes and national prejudices, accusations of promoting Ukrainian nationalism
- misunderstanding of Polish realities by students (often very young people, aged 16-17)
- non-payment for a dormitory, interrupting studies absenteeism.
